Olympic Whereabouts


All athletes participating at the Olympic Games Paris 2024

- the whereabouts information is collected by the National Olympic Committees (NOC) using ITA's 'Rooming' app
- the mandatory period of rooming information is:
 - during the Games Period (18 July 11 August) WHEN
 - the athlete is in France under the responsibility of the NOC



Athletes in the IJF Registered Testing Pool (RTP) / Testing Pool (TP) or in their national RTP / TP

- need to file their whereabouts as usual in ADAMS or Athlete Central
- all the obligatory elements must be in their report as in other times
- their location in ADAMS must be the same as in the 'Rooming' app







Obligatory elements of a whereabouts

1. Daytime availability




regular activity/ies

- other

dojo training, gym sessions, other forms of regular training, in case of injury physiotherapy, etc.

occasional availability, eg. home or other address during the day if there's no regular activity, or as complementary location



2. Competition(s) – if applicable

- competition ————

any type of competition, eg. club level, national or international, Olympic Games, also in other sports if applicable



3. Night-time availability

- overnight accommodation

any type of night accommodation, eg. home, hotel, Olympic Village, etc.



4. 60-minute time slot (for RTP members)

60min testing time connect to a location by own choice

Olympic Locations - 1

Olympic Village

The Paris Olympic village is spread across three towns called Saint-Denis, Saint-Ouen and l'Ile-Saint-Denis in the northern part of Paris, about 9 km (6 miles) from the city centre, on the banks of the river Seine.

Delegations and RTP/TP athletes are required to provide the exact rooming details within 24h to their arrival to the Olympic Village.

Available for doping control



Has 60min time slot




Has overnight accommodation

In the example: the athlete can be found at home in the morning, has enough time to perform possible doping control before starting the travel to the Games.

If not available for doping control before departure, use Travel.



If not staying at the Olympic Village, provide full address, incl. doorbell number.



List possible availability with 60min either in the morning or daytime.

Add ,Travel' to indicate no overnight accommodation if arrival is after midnight.

Olympic whereabouts - Olympic Village

Before departing to the Games, athletes need to add their:

- travel schedule to the Village (departure from home/arrival to the Village)
- competition day(s)
- availability for other days
- travel schedule from the Village (departure from the Village/ arrival to home)


Until being accommodated in a room at the Olympic Village, athletes are required to indicated that they:

 Are going to stay in the Olympic Village or at an official or at a non-official accommodation

After being accommodated in a room in or outside the Olympic Village, athletes need to provide full address including:

- Building number, floor, room number or
- Hotel, city, street, street number, floor, door number (if a private home, add doorbell details as well)

It is the athletes' choice whether to add the 60min time slot to the overnight accommodation or other program.




Has 60min time slot




Has 'Travel' to indicate no overnight accommodation

In the example, the athlete can be found at home in the morning, has enough time for a possible doping control before departing to start travel to the Games.

In the example: the athlete goes to the official training venue and spends the night at the Olympic Village.

At other times, the athlete is **free to** stay in the Village or go out to the city.

For training venue booking info turn to your National Olympic Committee.

If the training location is different than the official training venues, the regular postal address needs to be used in the whereabouts.

Olympic Sports Guide – Judo

TRAINING VENUE

→ General information

Training for the Judo competition will take place at the Parc des sports Auguste Delaune from Saturday 20 July to Friday 2 August 2024.

Sixteen (16) mats will be provided for athletes' training.

Training will be available from 09:00 to 17:45.

Please note that this schedule may change on some training days. There will be no training in the afternoon of the opening ceremony.

The conditions for booking or allocating training slots are yet to be determined. The system for pre-booking / modifying training session slots will be available at the Sports Information Centre in the Olympic Village or at the Sports Information Desk located at the competition venue. In addition, Paris 2024 plans to set up a digital reservation platform.

All training equipment will be approved by IJF and will comply with Rule 50 and Bye-law to Rule 50 of the IOC Olympic Charter.

→ Facilities at the training venue:

- reception desk
- → athletes' lounge
- changing rooms and showers (separate men's/women's)
- → sport equipment storage room
- → medical services
- weighing room (separate men's/women's)



→ Access to training venues

The training venues will only be accessible to holders of an identity document and a valid Olympic accreditation (CIAO). NOC members will be granted access to one or more training venues according to the sport code(s) received as part of their mission and carried by their accreditation.

Furthermore, the IOC has rethought the concept of specific passes for training venues. This access pass will no longer exist for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, but the requirements will be integrated into the "P" accreditation quotas. For more information, please refer to the Accreditation at the Olympic Games – Detailed Specifications (published in March 2023) and to Paris 2024 NOC Accreditation Update (published in April 2023) available on NOCnet.

For the Parc des sports Auguste Delaune, the maximum quota of "P" accredited persons allowed per venue, and per NOC, has been defined as follows:

- → one (1) to six (6) accredited athletes: 1 "P" accredited
- → seven (7) and beyond: two (2) "P" accredited

For the competition venue at Champs de Mars, the quota will be confirmed in March 2024.

Training sessions are open to the media unless they are declared closed by an NOC.

→ Food and beverage services

Given the short distance between the Olympic Villages and the training venue, as well as the limited time spent by the athletes on the training venue, no food service will be offered on site. A range of snacks to take away will be available at the Olympic Village. Additionally, cold drinks (water and isotonic drinks provided by Coca-Cola) as well as hot drinks (tea and coffee) will be available on training venues.

Example whereabouts – competition day





Available for doping control (after the competition)



Has 60min time slot

In the example, by adding the 60min time slot to the competition program, the athlete is not bound to arrive at the Village by a specific time.

When calculating the availability at the Competition Venue, always consider the time in transport from the Village / accommodation to the Arena.



Has overnight accommodation

Daily contest order is communicated on the day of the draw (25 July).



Example whereabouts - between two competition days





Has 'regular activity'

Has overnight accommodation

In the example, the athlete is training at the official training venue in the morning, later attends the competition as a judoka or spectator.

Competition is only the day when the athlete is competing.

60min time slot – where to add?

Be aware that the 60min time slot can only be added to a location where:

- the location is specific, can be easily identified by anyone, and
- the athlete can be found among a limited number of people, eg. training venue / gym / room / etc. **or**
- the athlete has a specific well-defined program with limited mobility within the location, eg. competition


Therefore, the 60min time slot **CANNOT be added** to programs like sightseeing or being at the competition arena when the athlete is not competing,

ONLY IN THE CASE WHEN

- the athlete is serving as a sparring partner/judoka before and/or after their competition day and spends the day with the competing team members.

Please, add this information both to the 'Rooming' app and for RTP/TP athletes to the 'Additional Information' rubric of a program entry in ADAMS or Athlete Central.
